

Editorial

Following the invasion of Kuwait, the media focus has switched from the plight of the Palestinians to the war in the Gulf. Yet the respect that Israel has gained in the International community from her policy of restraint will, unfortunately, vanish in the post-war period, when the focus will once again return to the Palestinian problem.

In the meantime, the Israeli Peace Movement has suffered yet another severe setback. The regretfull support by Yassir Arafat and the PLO for Saddam Hussein has left the leaders of the Israeli left disillusioned, disenchanted and somewhat angry

Conversely, their partners on the right of the political spectrum are now comforting themselves with the knowledge that they were,' right all along' and such terrorists can never be potential partners in peace.

Furthermore, their inclusion of the Moledet Party (who beleive in 'transfer' of arabs) into the Likud-led coalition has hammered another nail into the coffin of the Labour party and the peace movement in general, and given the Likud Government a majority of 66 seats in the Knesset (this is the largest majority since Likud came to power in 1977 under Menachem Begin).

In this edition of Koleinu, Yossi Sarid MK (member of the Citizen's Rights Movement) expresses his painful reaction to the Palestinian support for Saddam Hussein, whilst Debbie Huglin (Bogera Tnua and citizen of Israel) proposes the case for immediate retaliation in the gulf.

Apart from the feature articles on the Gulf, there is an enlightening piece on the characteristics of the Glasgae boy (which outshines the leeds culture article in the last edition!) an obituary on the late, not so great, Rabbi Meir Kahane and an update on the Nazi War Crimes legislation in Britain, plus all the regular bits 'n' pieces that make "KOLEINU" the archetypal toilet-reading magazine! enjoy enjoy...

Stop Press

At the time of going to press (15th Feb) Saddam Hussein has just released a statement offering a withdrawal from Kuwait. Sources say that he has accepted resolution 660 of the U.N. security council, which calls for the unconditional withdrawal from occupied Kuwait, but has stated a number of conditions of withdrawal:

- i) The inevitable 'linkage' Israeli withdrawal from the occupied territories.
- ii) Cancellation of all U.N. resolutions on the Gulf, including one's referring to trade embargo and sanctions.
- iii) Allied forces withdrawal from positions in the Gulf.
- iv) Withdrawal of Syrian intervention in

2. On the historic occasion of the founding of Kibbutz Tuval on 5th January, 1981, the Movement congratulates the founders, graduates of Ichud Habonim-Dror from Britain and South Africa, and the Tzofim of Israel. We wish them every success.

STATEMENT OF GARIN TUVAL

We, the members of the British group, have formed together in order to settle Kibbutz Tuval. We are at present undergoing preparation for our emigration, and we are providing a focal point for the Tuval momentum in Britain, be it in publicity, financial and moral support, or, most importantly, the recruitment of new members.

Our discussions have enabled us to draw up the following document as a statement of our basic common aims:

- 1. Zionism is the expression of the legitimate right of the Jewish people to self-determination. Our form of Zionism is to go and settle in Israel.
- 2. As the population of the Galil is sparse, we believe that it is one of the urgent challenges today to build new settlements in that area.
- 3. Through the communal life of Kibbutz, we can best build a society based on equality. Kibbutz also enables each member to participate in the running and the future of the community to a greater extent than in most other societies.
- 4. Some of the aims of Tuval that we hope to see are as follows:
- a) No material inequality between members. and equal opportunity for both sexes. b) The building and work of the Kibbutz should be done by the members themselves. c) We will ensure that Ivrit is the main language. d) We will ensure that a Jewish atmosphere will figure in all our activities and education including the celebration of Shabbat and the festivals. e) There should be freedom and tolerance of both political and religious expression.
- 5. It is an important aim of Tuval to integrate itself with all other communities in the Western Galil and play a role in the Israeli society in general.

They know where to find me

The initial Palestinian support for Saddam Hussein in the current Gulf crisis sent shock-waves through the Israeli peace camp, casting doubts about the role of the Palestinians as partners in joint peace efforts. The first leftist voice to be publicly raised was that of journalist and television personality Yaron London: "When you come again to ask my support for your "legitimate rights", you'll find that your shrieks of encouragement for Saddam Hussein have plugged my ears", he wrote.

A few days later Ratz MK Yossi Sarid, one of the outstanding champions of Palestinian rights in the eyes of the Israeli public, gave the Palestinians a public dressing-down, writing in "Ha'aretz" on August 17th: "If my reason for supporting the establishment of a Palestinian state had been based solely on the argument that the Palestinians, too, deserve a state - I would now withdraw my support."



ne needs a gas mask to overcome the poisonous and putrid smell of the P.L.O.'s stance regarding Saddam Hussein. The embraces between Yasser and Saddam are repulsive and frightening. For generations, the P.L.O. leadership has made

every possible mistake - not to mention the impossible ones. Now, with the outbreak of the Gulf crisis. they've done it again. Since I can't put it down to naivete, I attribute it to nationalist inflammation.

For many years I've tried to explain to any Palestinian who would listen that the Palestinian national movement must not build its entire world around the U.S.S.R. I told them that the leaders in the Kremlin might support the P.L.O. today, but they'd withdraw their support tomorrow if their own interest so dictated. Such an obvious statement always aroused strong opposition among my partners in dialogue. They really believed that the Soviet position would last forever. Now they're frustrated by the fact that last year's snow in the Balkan and Transcaucasian republics is of more interest to Gorbachev than the fate of the Palestinians.

Suddenly a new saviour has arisen -Saddam Hussein. It is he who will redeem the Palestinians from the suffering of the Israeli occupation. The Palestinian leaders, who went from one bed to another and there isn't an Arab ruler who didn't

share his bed with them for a while - have and MK Abdel Wahab Darawshe finally

learned nothing. Saddam, who would sell his own mother, won't sell them? How many more times must the Palestinians be used and discarded before Yasser Arafat understand that only the Palestinians and

the Israelis have a real interest in solving the Palestinian problem?

In the process of redeeming them, Saddam Hussein has already done terrible damage to the Palestinian cause. He has announced to the entire world that there is nothing wrong with acquiring territory by

force - and the Palestinians are the last people who should thank him for that. He has strengthened Shamir's claim that the Palestinian problem is not the heart of the Middle East conflict, that the area is problematic by its very nature. Saddam Hussein has also proved that - unlike the new

> world order in which successful efforts are made to solve conflicts through negotiation the Middle East is a planet

However, the greatest damage to the Palestinian cause has been in the area of world public opinion, traditionally the mainstay of the Palestinians. At a time when Saddam Hussein is depicted throughout the free world as the principal enemy of its peace and prosperity, Yasser Arafat appears as his faithful servant. If the co-ordinated efforts in the Gulf fail, the international community will see in the P.L.O. one of the main culprits. If the efforts succeed, the P.L.O. will be one of the main losers. The Americans and the Europeans will be in no hurry to invite Saddam's junior partner to the negotiating table. It is hard to know how the Gulf crisis will end, but it is easy to see that Arafat will emerge the loser.

When it comes to Israeli public opinion, the Palestinian position is particularly destructive. The P.L.O devoted the last two years to persuading everyone that it is a different P.L.O. - that it had reconciled itself to the existence of Israel and renounced terrorism. Now it has given the bucket such a kick that all the moderation has drained away. Saddam Hussein has already initiated wars against two of his neighbours. Someone who has attacked a Moslem state and an Arabstate is like a

mad bull that has gored more than once and will certainly be ready to attack the Jewish state. The Israeli Arabs themselves are aware of this very real danger, otherwise they would not have loudly and rightly demanded gas masks for their own protection. So how can Darawshe and Muhammad Miari support Saddam Hussein when he threatens to annihilate half of their state? For the first time the two MK's have put their civic loyalty into question. They will pay dearly for this mistake.

In recent years the Palestinian struggle has been elevated by the spirit of liberty which has pervaded it. Now all the wind has been taken out of its sails. If one can support Saddam Hussain, who murdered tens of thousands of "opponents of his regime" and to gas to death innocent Kurdish men, women, and children, maybe its not so terrible to support the policies of Shamir, Sharon and Rabin. Compared to Saddam Hussein's crimes, the sins of the government of Israel are white as snow. Reading Iraq's black record in Amnesty's White Paper, one comes to the conclusion that Sharon and Rabin are practically candidates for sainthood Arafat, Husseini, and Darawshe shouldn't be surprised now if the moral alarm they sound over atrocities in the occupied territories evokes no more than a faint echo.

If my reason for supporting the establishment of a Palestinian state had been based solely on the argument that the Palestinians, too deserve a state - I would now withdraw my support. I continue, however, to demand their right to self-determination and an independent state because

it is my right to get rid of the occupation and the harm it causes. They might deserve the occupation, but we don't. I insist, despite everything, on maintaining my human dignity, but I don't need Arafat, Husseini, and Darawshe for this supreme eff ort. It's all mine, and it's almost super-





have heard us called "shady" by a certain balding alte-kacher hippy from Southgate. However, where is Southgate now - huh?





NAZI WAR CRIMINALS IN LOTITATION LOTITATION

In October 1986 the British Government received information from the Los Angeles based Simon Wiesenthal Center that people suspected of committing horrific crimes in German or German-Occupied territories during the Second World War were living here. Warren Taylor plots the British Governments search for Nazi war criminals living in Britain.

n February 1988, the then Home Secretary, Douglas Hurd, established an "Inquiry into War Crimes" to be carried out by Sir Thomas Hetherington, Q.C., former D.P.P., and William Chalmers, former Crown Agent for Scotland.

The Hetherington/Chalmers Inquiry Report was presented to Parliament in July 1989. It found sufficient evidence to justify "a realistic prospect of conviction" for murder against three people. Seventy-eight other cases, they said, merited further investigation. The Report recom-

mended the swift introduction of legislation to enable the prosecution of those alleged to have carried out these bestial crimes.

In December 1989, the House of Commons held a full-scale debate on a motion backing the Inquiry's recommendations. M.P.s voted by a majority of 225 in favour of war crimes legislation.

In March 1990, the Government introduced the War Crimes Bill into Parliament. The Bill gives United Kingdom Courts jurisdiction over crimes of murder and manslaughter committed in German

or German-Occupied territory between 1939 and 1945.

Since then, there have been three full-scale debates on the Bill. On the occasions that M.P.s have discussed the issue, they voted overwhelmingly in favour of the legislation (Second Reading - a 5 to 1 majority; Third Reading - a 13 to 1 majority).

However, on 4th June, the House of Lords rejected the Bill - killing it off for that session.

The issue is simple. If you are a British citizen who commits murder abroad, you are liable to prosecution. But only people who were British citizens at the time they committed the act can be prosecuted. Why can people who came to Britain and assumed the vast privilege of British citizenship escape the responsibilities, duties and liability for criminal offences that go with it?

Detractors of the Bill cite it as being retrospective. Retrospective legislation makes an act a crime today, when yes-

terday it was not.

No new offence is to be created. Not only were these crimes against British laws when committed, they were also crimes under international law. We are talking about mass and individual murder.

The few changes in the rules of evidence (the laws used to gather and present evidence in Court) proposed by the Government are all in line with current practice and existing precedent.

For example, live video'd examination and cross-examination and recorded evidence and evidence from deceased witness are all provided for by the Criminal Justice Act, 1988. As in all criminal cases, it will be for the Judge to decide whether or not, in the interests of justice, evidence should be admitted into Court.

So why now after 45 years? - after all, these former Nazis have led respectable lives. Most appear to be assimilated into their host communities; have raised families and led productive lives.

For one thing - justice.

The fact that someone has concealed a crime for an unusual length of time does not mean it ceases to be a crime. If anything, 45 years' lapse between crime and legal redress should be classed as borrowed time. Time used for freedom and the enjoyment of democratic rights - when justice had the prior claim.

Borrowed time should work against the evader, not for him. What must be remembered is that war crimes trials are concerned with crime committed by a specific individual against other individuals. Books, films and exhibitions help us to understand how a supposedly civilised country could willingly plan such destruc-

Why can people who came to Britain and assumed the vast privilege of British citizenship escape the responsibilities, duties and liability for criminal offences that go with it?

tion - the destruction of a whole people.

Trials remind us of the individual who commits such crimes. The 1961 trial of Adolf Eichmann in Jerusalem was the trial of one man - not the trial of the National Socialist plan for the Final Solution of the Jewish People.

Trials show us that we as individuals are responsible for our own actions, and are accountable to ourselves and others. They show the hollowness of the defence of only obeying orders. It is an irony that one of the ten commandments given to a German soldier is, "never obey an illegal order".

How accurate are the memories of witnesses of events so long ago? Do "old

The fact that someone has concealed a crime for an unusual length of time does not mean it ceases to be a crime. If anything, 45 years' lapse between crime and legal redress should be classed as borrowed time.

men forget", as Lord Home alleged in the House of Lords back in December 1989? Kitty Hart, a survivor of Auschwitz extermination camp, told an international conference in London last year: "If a person has absolute power of life and death over you - even for an instant - that face will be etched on your mind forever. You cannot possibly forget it, even if you try."

Kitty Hart gave evidence last year in the High Court of Wuppertal, West Germany, at the trial of Auschwitz S.S. Officer Gottfried Weise. He used to shoot tin cans off the heads of prisoners. Blind in one eye, his actions usually led to the death of his victim - often a child. The Judge was impressed by the accuracy of the evidence given. Winding up, he remarked that those who spoke were calm and without emotion. Weise was convicted on their evidence.

Kitty Hart and the many supporters of the legislation seek only one thing: justice. On 7th November, the Queen's speech confirmed that - despite the rejection of the Bill in the Lords - the Government would reintroduce the measure in this Parliamentary session.

However, the future of the War Crimes Bill in now uncertain. John Major, the new Prime Minister, voted against the Hetherington / Chalmers recommendation in December, 1989. Both Margaret Thatcher and David Waddington - the strongest supporters of legislation in the Cabinet - are no longer in their posts.

We must now encourage the Government under its new leadership to follow the fine example set by its predecessor and continue the support for legislation enabling the prosecution of those living in this country who have allegedly committed murder or manslaughter.



The new reality

The situation in the Middle East is at present unpredictable. *Baron Frankel* argues that in the post war period a new reality will prevail.

he situation of war is a potentially catastrophic one ,in more ways than are at first imagined. The first casualty of war ,is inevitably truth-to tell the press and hence your enemy real plans and strategy would be military suicide, and as much in Israel as anywhere else. Even in Britain 'the cradle of democracy' it was temporarily suspended during both world wars: in times of such crisis it simply isn't efficient enough. Even in Israel's short history, supporting unreservedly the government of the day and it's actions, overt or covert, has become a strong tradition. Today, however, we do not have a consensus government, but one which is staunchly annexationist, virtually to a man:

"The ideal of the Likud... remains a state of Israel between the sea and the Jordan River...for future generations and for mass aliya. (Nov '90)

So said Prime Minister Shamir, widely accredited as being on the left wing of the government. This voice indeed is one of broad consensus. In his government, however, is now included, in the inner cabinet, Rehavam Ze'evi-the political father and propagator of 'mass transfer'(a rather futile euphemism for deportation). He has already said that the only circumstances under which mass transfer could be achieved, are those of war.

Let's not forget todays status quo came from the meleé following the '67 war. Who started it is irrelevant, it is the victor who writes the history, as one famous victor turned loser once claimed. David Ben-Gerion who few can label an extreme rightist, had a distinct agenda for the '48 war that included the capture of Judea and Samaria. We know what the declared aims of this government are, can we imagine their hidden agenda? We can begin with remembering that one of the inner cabinet seized the solution of the Arab-Israel conflict by deporting 1,500,000 forcibly "over the border".

The situation of war, as I've said is a potentially catastrophic one. In such circumstances democratic processes are simply not viable: Detention without trial, censorship,internment, suppression of opposition, security clampdown, curphew and deportation are accepted measures. At the time of writing (11.2.91) with Israel in actually no intrinsic danger, these signs are very clearly already manifesting themselves. This is fact, not merely anti-Zionist propaganda.

We who have Israels' future most at heart have a duty to be aware of it's actions and their consequences. According to Raphael Eitan's "Tsomet" party (also in cabinet), given the Soviet Aliyah it would only take the transfer of a mere 600,000 to secure a demographic majority of Jews in "all" of Israel (Med Sea to Jordan River) until at least the hundredth anniversary of the state, hence robbing the left and even Labour, of its main line of argument against annexation.

Such thought and considerations are not extremist musings. However they are calculations at the center of policy making in Israel. We must wake up to that fact. I believe Israel, for various reasons will get involved in this war. As spokespeople are adamant to point out, "Israel will retaliate, but only when the time is right". The cease fire at the end of this war will be de facto a reality and I believe a new reality. Whatever thet is it will be de facto the status quo, and changing that, as we all know is an impossible task. It will be a new reality of concern to us is who's reality it will be.

ivan resnik was the tuval representative at this winter's veida. here are some of his thoughts on reflection.

HERE I AM sitting in the departure hall at Heathrow Airport, waiting to board my flight back to Israel. On one hand, I'm really excited to be going back to Israel, back home to Tuval and my cows, yet a bit sad leaving behind me twelve days of good memories. I'd like to state right at the beginning that all in all I had a really good time in England, and enjoyed being at Veida - or to put it in British Movement language - I had a 'wicked' time!

On my arrival I basically went straight from the Airport to the London offices, where I was confronted by many people, running around chaotically and hectically planning Veida and various Machanot. This action and buzz continued to exist until the very last day of Veida.

In my opinion Veida was a very big success, and I really hope that you all got as much out of it, if not more, than I did. A special thanks to the Tzevet Veida for all their good work.

The motion which I believe deserves mentioning, and that sticks out in my mind, was the unanimous acceptance of the support of people who may wish to go to Israel if a war has to break out. As people spoke proposing the Motion, and as all the hands went up afterwards - I sat with tears in my eyes, not really knowing what to do with myself. This to me just proved the uniqueness of the Movement, as well as the people in it.

I believe that Veida left many important questions and issues unanswered, and it is now up to you to continue these discussions, and educating yourselves in various Movement frameworks, and to make sure that these issues are dealt with now, and not put off until next Veida.

Having got to know the British Movement and most of you a little, I believe Tuval, as the Movement's Kibbutz Y a'ad, has a very relevant and real role to play, and offers all of you a very exciting framework for Aliya.

I hope that all your Rec. Schemes and Machanot were a great success. Best of luck for the rest of the year in your various Kinim, and Good Luck for the "Misgeret Aliya". I also hope to see as many of you, as soon as possible, both in Israel and on Tuval Neh Vehagshem



Motion

Habonim-Dror believes that in order to combat Fascism effectively, we must:

Justice not vengeance

Elliot Reuben reports on an evening in Oxford with Simon Wiesanthal, a survivor of the Shoah.

imon Wiesenthal is one of those people who make you wonder just what, exactly, you are doing with your life. Eighty years old, a survivor from Malthausen and the horrors contained there. Wiesenthal has dedicated his life to hunting down, and bringing to justice, over seventy men who were responsible for perpetrating the most gruesome of crimes imaginable. He is, and has been for over forty years, a "Nazi Hunter".It's quite rare to see 800 Jews sitting in silence, but sit in silence they did. Organised by the Lubavitch L'Chaim Society. Wiesenthal's talk was the final part of an evening (where firstly dinner with the great man was available for the small price of £1.80), which apparently cost £15,000. As Wiesenthal entered, the crowd rose silently to their feet, in awe and respect. "Ladies and Gentlemen, I am not a Jewish James Bond; I am only a survivor." For the next hour and a half, the expectant crowd was rewarded with a fine account of the life of Simon Wiesenthal from his leaving Malthausen (weighing 90 lbs), to tracking down Adolf Eichmann, to sending a list of War Criminals believed to be resident in the U.K. to the British Government.

It was his story of the hunt for Eichmann which uncovered an interesting point: When asked to go with a Warrant to search the Eichmann family home. Wiesenthal requested that someone should go in his place, lest he should touch a door handle, touched by Eichmann. To this day, Simon Wiesenthal has never come into physical contact with any of the War Criminals he has found. Simon Wiesenthal talked at length about the fact that Nazism introduced a new form of mass murderer; these were not people who went into the street with a machine gun and shot thirty people, or people who silently stalked fourteen or fifteen girls in a New York suburb. These people killed 20,000 from a distance of 500 km. Their weapon was a pen.lt was Eichmann again who provides us with a point to bear in mind for the future. Whilst drinking with some officers in a Casino, a Lieutenant asked him about what would happen after

the war, if the Germans lost and the atrocities were discovered. "100 people dead is a catastrophe," smiled Eichmann, "One million is a statistic". Wiesenthal has suffered numerous attacks - hostile politicians who publicly oppose his work; others who tried to starve his Jewish Documentation Centre of funds; he has even had his flat bombed. Why, then, does he continue his work? 45 years on, can't we just let it rest? He told a story which explained to him why he couldn't ever give up.

In 1947, three Rabbis came to him telling of stories they had heard of a store of Hebrew books found by the Allies in the mountains. On arrival, after a long and wearisome journey, they discovered it was more than a "store" - it was intended to be a museum. A museum of "Jews", a race who were intended not to exist, in the minds of the Nazis, so that future genera-

tions could see the books out of "historical interest"

In addition to the books was another reminder - the skeletons of thirty Jews, who were killed by lethal injection and boiled to remove their flesh.

As they walked around the libraries, in shock at the actual concept before their eves, one of the Rabbis cried out - he had found a book from his own home, belonging to his sister. He opened it; inside was a hurriedly-written message: "Whoever finds this book, please give it to my beloved brother. The murderers are in the village - they will be here in a moment. Please don't forget us and don't forget our murderers." In the car, driving home with the three weeping Rabbis, Wiesenthal saw this as more than a message from a sister to her brother, but as a message from all those who suffered at the hands of the Nazis, to those of the present who wished to bury all memories.

Simon Wiesenthal is an extraordinary human being. He needn't have said a word from his lectern, for his presence alone is impressive enough. For Wiesenthal, one of the most celebrated humanitarians of our time, represents a challenge - a challenge to those who believed that the underground routes to Argentina would safeguard them; a challenge to those who believe that memories should be buried after 45 years; or worse, that those memories are mere fabrication. Most importantly, Simon Wiesenthal is a challenge to our own, personal complacency.

The necessity of retaliation

Never before has Israel not been in control of her own destiny. *Debbie Huglin*, Bogera Tnua, now living in Israel believes it is morally & politically unacceptable

pparently, in many countries outside of Israel, journalists are still attempting to propagate the soothing thought that Israel will not retaliate. After all, what reason does Israel have to retaliate? America is doing a fine job of protecting Israel; indeed, she has already greatly reduced the threat of Scud missile attacks. Moreover, Israel is receiving handsome compliments from the world over - both financially and verbally for the restraint which she has shown. Better still, Israeli non-retaliation has kept the coalition unbroken and has not given Iran a pretext to abandon her neutrality.

The justifications are apparently plentiful; the conclusion is ostensibly clear: no positive benefit is to be gained from an Israeli retaliation.

As an Israeli, I would like to explain why Israel has no choice other than retaliation

One of the reasons which lay behind the creation of the state of Israel was to rid the Jews of their status of defencelessness. In World War Two, the world witnessed the culminating point of this status, composed of a long history of persecution. Jewish people cowered before Ger-

man-made gas, and were told afterwards that they "went like sheep to the slaughter". The State of Israel was established with the principle of "Never Again" in mind. Never again shall we cower before Germanmade gas. Never again shall we be defenceless. By not retaliating, Israel would be betraying one or her most important principles.

It is very difficult to accept the fact that we are not defending ourselves; it is even more difficult to accept the fact that we are letting others do this for us. In Israel we sit passively, while American soldiers are fighting for our protection. That our defence should depend upon the lives of American soldiers is quite simply unacceptable, both on a moral and on a political level. Morally, it is hard to tolerate the

fact that the Americans are defending us; politically, we are placing ourselves in the vulnerable position of becoming the fifty-first state of America; our debt of gratitude, of money and of blood becomes simply unpayable.

The next point touches a rather delicate subject: that of money. For one must admit that Israeli restraint is not merely a function of Israeli principle and understanding - we are also receiving enormous rewards for our restraint, in political and financial terms, as well as military aid.

This "pay-off" makes it much more difficult to be proud of a policy of restraint than were it a decision based solely on the facts of the situation, with no external reward.

Not only it is immoral that we should

ask others to do our fighting for us. it is also difficult for Israelis to digest this fact. Israelis are very proud of the army. Indeed we have no choice; the army represents our very existence. With the army, we comfort ourselves, our existence is assured, our security is protected, our continuation is enabled. In the current situation, one has begun to wonder if there is actually anything which the Israeli army could do which the American army isn't doing. If Israelis lose faith in their army, the country will face just as serious a threat to her existence and her essence as is posed by any external enemy. Israeli morale is steadily sinking as we stand by and watch the responsibility of our own existence being placed in someone else's hands.

Until now, most Israelis have agreed with the practice of restraint. We understand such a policy best furthers the interests of the coalition. We have shown the world that in Israeli term's, military action represents defence and not revenge. We have shown our willingness to co-operate with other countries of the world, in the hope of stabilising this turbulent area. We held back - and the world showered praise

on us. That praise will be forgotten long before the Israel population will truly have overcome the traumatic experience we have gone through during this war. That praise will be forgotten long before the Israeli population fully regains her self-respect, her pride in her ability of self-defence, and her security in the principle of

"Never Again". In Israel, there is a feeling of frustration that we are not in control of our destiny. This frustration is gradually turning into impatience.

Whatever the outcome, Israel has to retaliate. And the time is drawing near.

Hill in Manchester

Ray Hill is a leading member of the Anti-Facist movement. As a mole for Searchlight magazine he penetrated the hightest echelons of the British Facist Movement. Karen Ackerman reports on his visit to Manchester University Union

"Let us rid ourselves once and for all of Jews. The Holocaust was a hoax, let's make it real."

this terrifying quotation is taken from a leaflet circulated in Manchester in the Summer. More disturbing is the fact that this leaflet is part of a well-organised campaign that tries to deny the reality of the Holocaust. Fascist Movements like this are active and strong in Manchester and other cities in Britain, and it was to make us aware of this fact that Ray Hill, ex-leader of the Nazi British Movement, turned Searchlight "mole", came to speak in the Manchester Univer-

sity Union.

Ray Hill spoke passionately about the Fascist Campaign against Asians, Jews, and other "Aliens". His main point, however, was not just to educate us about the evils of Fascism - but to urge us to help in the fight against it. He said that "the fight against Fascism can never be won", but that it is our "duty" to try and contain it. We cannot just talk of the danger of Fascism, we must educate others about it and stand up against it.

The evening was basically a call to action to join the fight against Fascism.

The importance of this was brought home to me when I sat in the Union Cof-

fee Bar a few days before the event, and a student, upon receiving a leaflet publishing the speech, asked me what it was.

He was totally ignorant about Fascism and had no idea about the desecrations of Jewish graveyards and the attacks on Asians that have been going on. He was not Jewish or Asian, and therefore felt this issue did not concern him. I was reminded of the famous lines by Pastor Niemoller, which Ray Hill also quoted in his speech, to encourage us to act against Fascism:

"First they came for the Communists and I did not speak out because I was not Communist.

Then they came for the Catholics and I did not speak out because I was not Catholic. Then they came for the Jews and I did not speak out because I was not Jewish.

Then they came for me and there was noone left to speak".

"It is vital that everyone should be educated about Fascism, and we should rally round and fight the menace that threatens us all.

Habo-Dror in Budapest

On a visit with the British Zionist Federation, Mazkira Mandy Huglin visited our counterparts in Hungary... and found a "magic formula"

udapest is dark, cold and depressing. It's a place where shops sell next to nothing of any interest, where people live simple lives, and where life is cheap. However, through the gloom, I saw a glimmer of hope that has caused me great excitement and enthusiasm. For in Budapest, the capital of Hungary, there are two very dedicated people who, just a matter of months ago, took it upon themselves to try to bridge the gap between the adult and children's communities by establishing a Zionist Youth Movement - none other than Dror-Habonim.

During the first two days of my visit to Hungary, with the British Zionist Federation, I saw much of Jewish Budapest.

- The Reichman School recently opened up, and with an attendance of over 400 children, taught by Jewish Hungarians and ten Shlichim from Israel.
- The Jewish Museum, with its hundreds of artefacts and antiques, and memorials to the Shoah, which wiped out 90% of the Hungarian Jewish population.

• On Friday evening, a Rabbinical Seminary, to take part in a memorable Shul Service.

However special these individual places and events were, nothing really tied together until Saturday evening, when we visited the Oneg Shabbat Club. We entered a tiny room, that once was used as a Shul, packed to the brim with many enthusiastic Jews. The atmosphere was incredible; we were a group of about a hundred Zionists, aged from five to ninety, singing songs together. It was there that I met Dror-Habonim Hungary, George and Mike. We talked for a short time. I was very excited to meet them, and to start finding out how it all began. We arranged to meet properly the next day, and so we did.

The meeting was a strange experience. The four of us, myself, Andrew, George and Mike, sat around a coffee table in the Hotel Cafe, and passed on all our thoughts about Zionism, Judaism and, of course, Habonim-Dror. These 17 year-olds are just fantastic. Together they run the

newly-formed Hungarian Movement, with about 150 "Chanichim" - who are 14-30 year-olds. The group in Budapest meets regularly on Sunday mornings, in an old disused Synagogue

We talked much about how "our" Movement is today, here in Britain, and how difficult things are. Our problems are so different from theirs. They need a building, the support of the adult community, Madrichim, and, more urgently - materials, Tochniot, Hadracha tips ... What they don't need and have plenty of is enthusiasm, commitment, and a sense of purpose. We sound exactly the opposite! I came away, buzzing with ideas, fuelled by this dedication, and confident that I could do the same for people around - but I think the only answer is for all those who no longer know or remember why they're still involved with the Movement, to take a swift visit to Budapest, and to discover for themselves the magic formula.

The most we can do from here is to keep in touch with them, and supply them with what they ask for. If anyone wants their addresses - I've got them. That's basically it - just to put their position in a final perspective - Their biggest dilemma, as one of them told me, was whether to stay in Hungary and recruit others, or to do as he really wants to, and just go straight to Israel.

on the grounds of racism in 1988. Dani Margolis
traces his life before his murder...

artin David Kahane was born on August 1st, 1932, the son of a Rabbi and his atvian immigrant wife. He was an active member of Betar, and at the age of 25 he became a Rabbi. Seeing threats to the American Jewish community from black militants, he began gaining support on Campus under the name of King.

In 1968 he formed the JDL (Jewish Defense League) intended to protect elderly Jews in run-down areas, but soon

got involved in angry confrontations with black militants, and later in violent protests on behalf of Soviet Jewry.

In 1971 he moved to Israel and set up a JDL faction, Kach ("Thus"), and gained election in 1984 as a consequence of the war in Lebanon and 400% inflation, calling for forced deportations of Arabs from the West Bank and Gaza. He tried to lead

his followers into Arab villages, provoking riots, but later his Movement was denounced as racist by both sides of the Israeli political spectrum.

In 1988 a new law banning racist and anti-democratic parties was passed with Kahane in mind - a decision which was upheld by the Supreme Court. Kahane vowed to run again, but his violent death curtailed his ambition. His murder caused much controversy, with some claiming him a martyr, whilst in the Knesset only 20 of the 120 members turned up to grant him a minute's silence, many

considering him "persona non grata" and a racist

Reactions in Israel were mixed. Kach supporters rallied, seeking vengeance, shouting "Kill the Arabs!". An Israeli motorist swung through an Arab village, opened fire, and killed two elderly Arabs. There have been continuing calls not to employ Arabs, and police arrested three Kach leaders on 26th November for "shocking revelations of hooliganism" against Arabs and Jews employing Arabs.

we must not revel in the death of any one man, but even Dr. Lionel Kopelowitz, one of the leaders of British Jewry, could not bring himself to condone Kahane.

The Kach Movement itself now has a problem - they have no charismatic replacement for Kahane - Kach's Israeli lawyer said, "No-one can fill his shoes; without Kahane, Kach will never be the same". There is a contest for the leadership, but whatever happens to the Movement itself, the ideology will never be

eradicated.

The Kach Movement has taken a large influx of members from American-born Yeshiva students and Israeli uneducated who believed the system had ignored them. They were open to charismatic leadership with a sense of purpose. In Israel, Kahane was always seen in a political light, calling for Arab expulsion, but to

many Americans he WAS Judaism. Was Kach a one-man show, as stated by Dr. Friedman, author of "The False Prophet", a biography of Kahane?

It is our duty as educators on the left to continue to teach anti-racism on all levels, especially from within. Kahane was not only sick in himself, but had symptoms of a sickness overtaking many young Jews today both in Israel and in the Diaspora. Only by education and a long struggle can we hope to eradicate racism from our doorstep and the world at large.

The question must be asked - if such a man was outlawed from Israeli public life by the Knesset and the Supreme Court, then why did the Sephardi Chief Rabbi Eliahu, paid civil servant of the State and spiritual mentor of half the population, give the principle eulogy at Kahane's funeral? Was it his job to honour a proclaimed racist who on the one hand called for "Never Again", and on the other called for policies which, as in Germany in the 1930's, would encourage such atrocities to reoccur, with the victims taking the role of oppressor? All phonecalls and letters from "well-wishers" have been appreciated. The term 'Kol Hakavod' (basically,translated to 'good on ya') has been exhausted by everyone we hear from but, at the same time,we vow to punch the next person who says it. Kibbutz parents and madrichim have been supportive, by supplying a constant stream of chocolate brownies and our Gizbarit (accountant) has let us go wild in the Kolbo. Itzik, the Mazkir of Rosh Hanikra was today repoted as saying that he is: "extremely proud of the Shnatties as they are the-best Zionists I know."

We feel compelled to thank Amotz for always inquiring how our morale is . The question has now become a standing joke amongst us . When our "morale" is not faring well, we will let you know.

Thanks to Mandy for coming out when she did and jumping on the bandwagon, "Here I am in the Holy land!!"

Before Shnat, I often wondered how we could make our year memorable because, undoubtedly, we are not a run-of-the-mill Schichva. This has come true, but not in the way I imagined.

Additional thanks to the exilea Shnatties who have provided us with invaluable comments and updates such as, "Do you know that Israel was attacked earlier this morning?" Really? We must not have been aware - too busy running around with our gasmasks firmly strapped to our faces.

AN OPEN LETTER TO FAISAL HUSSEINI

Dear faisal Husseini,

I READ RECENTLY IN THE "INDEPENDENT" THAT YOU had expressed regrets over the scud attacks on Tel-Aviv as well as the inevitable suffering of civilians in Baghdad. Thank you. Yours was a welcome, though reportedly half-hearted, addition to the world's dwindling stock of sanity.

You may remember how a few winters ago, after arriving home from Lebanon, dozens of Israeli reservists, some without even changing their army issue "arctic" boots, went to the Prime Minister's office in Jerusalem to join demonstrations against the war. Iwas among them

It seemed the natural thing to do.We were not prepared to refuse to serve, but neither were we prepared to remain silent.

Most of us huddled in the rain outside Mr. Shamir's residence in those days had served in front-line units but were just as ready to take part in mass rallies protesting against the lebanon war, against the occupation of the West

Bank and Gaza and against the building of settlements on what had been arab land.

We marched we demonstrated ,we faced the threat of violence. Some Israeli.s risked even military prison rather than take part in what was considered to be the oppression of the Palestinians.

Some fellow Israelis called us peaceniks. Others used less complimentary epithets. It made no difference.

The PLO, we beleived, genuinely represented the Palestinians and so Israel had no choice but to talk to them. Today,i, at least, don't know what to beleive. The same Yassir Arafat who said he was willing to recognise Israel is now enthusiastically backing the man whose missiles are raining down on Tel-Aviv.

On the West Bank, villagers are expressing delight at the destruction.

But what of our friends? What of Hanna Siniora, of Prof. Sari Nusseibeh, of Bethlehem, now held in six months administrative detention, accused by the Israelis of passing on information to Iraq. All of these gentlemen had declared themselves as being in favour of a peaceful solution. To many Israelis, they were beacons of light in the long night of Jewish-Arab enmity.

Where are their voices now when those who believe in peace and co-existence really need them? I recall a Likud-voting army comrade telling me one freezing night in Lebanon. that my Arab friends would let me down-or worse.

Most of the men in my unit agreed with him. Now I am forced to ask, was he right? Were our Peace Now demonstrations merely naive?

Obviously, there are pressures and even dangers that discourage those who might want to express their disapproval of Saddam Hussein's tactics. But the silence of moderate palestinians in the face of such a murderous and unprovoked assault on Israel will be interpreted as approval for the assault.

And those who remain silent will have pulled the rug from under the feet of Israelis who still believe in peace, justice and an end to the occupation. It is a silence that bears the mark of betrayal.
